Ashland took 1st overall with 70.5 points (a score accumulated from all tests, FPS, Written Composition, Written Assessments, and Quick Recall), beating Boyd's 32.5 handily. The Future Problem Solving team of Hayleigh Buckler, Kaya Ross, Bri Nivens, and Gwen Akers, coached by Jeff Kennard and Erin Reynolds, took 1st place. Quick Recall won 1st for the 10th consecutive year! Their Finals opponent, Boyd County, has been a formidable opponent this season. Ashland caught fire and played a perfect match, defeating Boyd 47-23. Congrats to the District Quick Recall Team of Logan Coovert, Ace Farris, Hannah Laney, Chrissy Brown, Joslin Wireman, and Myintmo Tun.

Criminal Justice with Mark McDowell

As I walked across the platform in 1984 to receive my diploma from Blazer High School, I would have never imagined I would be teaching a course here 35 years later... I would have called you crazy! Well, here I am, 35 years later, instructing students on one of Blazer's newest courses: Intro to Criminal Justice.

Ask any of my students about the components of the Criminal Justice system and they will quickly tell you law enforcement, courts and corrections. This fall, 30 students sat down in the classroom with me and we began to explore the Criminal Justice system. As we wrapped up the first half of this year, the students were exposed to issues related to law enforcement and the courts. We've had many guests this semester including representatives from the Ashland PD. Bovd Co. Sheriff's Office, and the Kentucky State Police. Boyd County Commonwealth Attorney Rhonda Copley has also come out to speak to our class about functions of her office in the court system.

Boyd Circuit Judge John Vincent accommodated us on an awesome field trip to observe arraignments in his courtroom on November 20th. The students were able to see an array of felony cases come before him in this non-scripted insight into the workings of our court system. My hope is that students in this course will prepare today for a rewarding career in the Criminal Justice system.



Ashland Family Resource Center

Since 1991, the Ashland Family Resource Center has aimed to alleviate barriers that may be contributing to a student's inability to focus while trying to obtain their education. Services provided by AFRC are available for students and families year-round. AFRC serves Crabbe and Hager Elementary Schools as well as the Ashland Head Start and KERA Preschool Programs. Beth Martin, MSSW, CSW is the Coordinator of the Center.

During the 2019-2020 fiscal school year, AFRC has already provided emergency clothing assistance on 342 occasions, and purchased new outfits and shoes for more than 100 students through a partnership with Friends of the Children. Other services provided by AFRC include, but are not limited to, the following: school and personal care items, holiday assistance, school-based mental health services/referrals, emergency transportation, glasses, hygiene, attendance, food, furniture, and summer camps. In collaboration with local churches, weekend food bags are provided to an average of 157 students.

AFRC strives to make sure no student or family struggles to have their needs met, whether from direct assistance or community referrals. AFRC will continue to do whatever it takes!

Cheerleaders Take on Disney World














Once a Tomcat...





Andrew Greene ('86) grew up in the Ashland schools attending Charles Russell Elementary, Coles/Putnam Junior High and then graduating from Paul G. Blazer High School in 1986. He received his degrees in Business Administration from Marshall University and Kentucky School of Banking (KBA). He is now serving our community as the Vice President/Loan Officer of Kentucky Farmers Bank.

When asked about his fondest memory of his time as a Tomcat, Mr. Greene said he could not narrow it down, "I loved my high school years. My closest friends came from that time in my life, not just the people in my class, but classes ahead of me and behind me. My wife and kids probably get tired of hearing me tell the same stories over and over. Tomcats are a very close knit bunch. I go to a lot of the high school ballgames. When we get behind I will sometimes say, 'It's about time to remember we are Ashland.' I don't know if I really know what that means, but I know it's the way I feel. We are Ashland!"

Judge Davis, Circuit Judge of the 32nd Circuit of the Commonwealth of Kentucky is a proud 1985 graduate of Paul G. Blazer High School. Upon graduation, he pursued his Bachelor of Arts in Political Science at the University of Kentucky, and followed that up with his Juris Doctor from the University of Louisville.

Judge Davis states, "Because of the Ashland Public Schools System, I was extremely well prepared for college. Blazer is like a college campus and I recall using my high school notes to help study for several college classes. Also, the discipline, organizational skills and mentoring I received from participating in the school music program continue to influence me to this day. I can still hear Band Director David Miller saying, 'Don't be on time, be early.' Great advice!" The experiences he recalls most fondly are from his time with the band, "I will always cherish my time playing saxophone in the Paul G. Blazer Band. I made lifelong friends and, working together, we put together an award-winning band that rivaled some college programs in sound."

Judge Davis encourages students, "Always seek God's guidance for your life. Also, there will always be something or someone attempting to pull you away from your goals in life or take them from you once achieved; stay focused on what you want in life and keep pushing toward your goals despite the obstacles life throws at you. You may not get to where you want, when you want, but you will have a much better chance if you have a plan."

He is very proud of working in the Kentucky Legislature and Attorney Generals Offices. His long list of accolades include being elected as both District and Circuit Judge, representing the United States in diplomatic exchanges through the National Association of Young Political leaders, being named "Kentucky Judge of the Year" by CASA and being elected by his peers as Vice President / President Elect of the Kentucky District Judges Association. It was also an honor for him to give the 2002 Commencement Address at Paul G. Blazer High School.

He is proud to be a Tomcat. "The 'Tomcat Nation' is a family, and once you are part of that tradition, it never leaves you. The Ashland Schools have produced so many talented, successful and influential people who have gone on to be movers and shakers far and wide in entertainment, business and government.
