



After four years of development, Kentucky's new 5-star accountability system for public schools is now active. For the 2018-2019 school year, the Ashland Independent Schools were rated 3 stars for each level - elementary, middle and high school. The star ratings are determined by combining scores in five areas – Proficiency (reading and mathematics), Separate Academic (science, social studies and writing), Growth (reading and mathematics), Transition Readiness (preparedness for career after high school) and Graduation. Scores were obtained through state testing of students in grades 3-8 as well as juniors and seniors at the high school.

We are especially proud of our elementary school students who showed tremendous gains in reading, mathematics and writing. It is reassuring to know that the performance of our youngest students will lead to further improve-

ments as they progress through the district.

While we celebrate the achievement of our students and our schools, we recognize that there is still much to improve. The district's scores surpass state averages in almost every content, the difference being quite large in some areas. Additionally, we are also determined to see a rise in our scores for science, social studies and transition readiness, as it would greatly increase our overall scores at each level.

There, you will find more information for our district and learn more about each of our schools – their performance on last year's assessments and star ratings.

Two Blazer Students Named As National Merit Scholar Semifinalists

Approximately 16,000 students nationwide were announced as National Merit Scholarship semifinalists this month. Seniors Kyle McComis and Logan Coovert earned this distinguished honor. These academically talented seniors have an opportunity to continue competing for some of the 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$31 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. Over 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and about half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship earning the Merit Scholar title.

To become a Finalist, Kyle and Logan must submit a detailed scholarship application in which they provide information about their academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. They must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by the principal, write an essay, and earn SAT or ACT scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test.

National Merit Scholarship winners of the 2020 class will be announced in four nationwide news releases beginning in April and concluding in July. These scholarship recipients will join more than 345,000 other distinguished young people who have earned the Merit Scholar title.

Afterschool ACT tutoring is being offered for students wishing to see improvements to their current ACT score. Students will recieve a voucher to take the ACT for free in December if they participate in at least seven of the nine sessions offered. Mr. Campbell believes that putting our students in small group study sessions with our outstanding teachers is a formula for success. He is providing the voucher to ensure that no obstacle stands in the way of ensuring our students have the best chance of success after high school.

These study sessions will be offered through November so that students can continue to work on the particular skills they need to sharpen. Depending on turnout and availability, Blazer may offer these study sessions to prepare for the spring ACT as well.

Every Day Counts!

All parents care about their children's success in life. Unfortunately, they often fail to realize how quickly absences can add up to academic trouble. It is important that parents take note of the connection between attendance and graduation. There is a correlation between having strong school attendance in elementary and middle school and successfully graduating from high school. It is also important for students to realize the cost of absenteeism. Nearly half of the students surveyed by Get Schooled believe they could skip a day a week and still not suffer academically; this is not the case! Attendance matters at every grade level.
