

ACADEMIC ACCOLADES ABOUND!!!!!

In the world of academic competition, the State Governor's Cup Finals are the culminating competition for the high school and middle school; whereas, the elementary schools finalize their seasons at Regional Governor's Cup.



The Blazer Academic Team had another outstanding

season. The team gave an exceptional performance at the KAAC Governor's Cup State Finals in Louisville. The quick recall team came into the "Sweet 16" as a two seed after wins over Muhlenburg County and Paducah Tilghman. The team played phenomenally against Dixie Heights to move on to the "Elite 8" where they lost to the eventual state champs, DuPont Manual. The members of the quick recall team were Stephen Corbitt, Aryssa Damron, Cameron Garner, Jason Zheng, Hannah Wade, Kyle Conley, Shelby Street, Doug Mollett, and Shannon Cook. Several of Blazer's written assessment testers had noteworthy performances. Aryssa Damron placed 6th in the state in language arts, Stephen Corbett placed 10th statewide in social studies, and Cameron Garner was 11th in arts and humanities.

The road to State Governor's Cup is a long and hard-fought road. The Quick Recall team won the district by defeating Fairview High School 52-3 to move on to regionals where they lost in a tie-breaker to Russell but moved



on to state. The team took 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in all 5 testing areas at district. Stephen Corbitt was 1st in social studies and 3rd in arts and humanities at regionals. Cameron Garner was 2nd in math, Johathan Dingess was 5th in math, Shelby Street 5th in social studies, Jason Zheng 5th in science, and Hannah Wade 4th in science.. Overall Blazer placed 10th in the state out of 200 high schools that compete in the state finals. Coach Eric Lambert is already making plans for summer practices and competitions.

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District News

Verity had a stellar academic season as well. At District Governor's Cup Verity won first place in every category. They went on to regionals with wins in arts and humanities-1st Wren Jenkins and 3rd Dawson Coovert, science-2nd Nate Rickman and 3rd Wren Jenkins, math—3rd Zach Stafford, and social Studies-3rd Dawson Coovert. The guick recall team advanced to state and won its pool, posting wins over North Oldham and North Laurel. They advanced to the "Sweet 16" and defeated Edmonson County before losing to the eventual state champs, Meyzeek Middle School. Overall, the team finished 6th in the state out of 243 middle school teams. Coaches Dan Boyer and Tonya Brady are proud of the team's accomplishments this year.

Health for Kindergarten

This is a reminder that very soon there will be a mad dash to get your child ready to enter kindergarten. Everyone wants their child to exceed in school; a healthy child has the best chance of success. Head Start Children are given health packets for school registration. Your child's health packet will only be as current as the records we have on file. Your child should leave preschool with the kindergarten health requirements:

- Current immunizations
- Physical (dated within 12 months of school start date)
- Dental Exam (dated within 12 months of school start date)
- Vision Exam (was due by Jan. 1 of your child's first year in preschool)

First Grade

The first grade classes at Oakview had a visit from the Huntington Museum of Art on March 13. Ms. Linda taught a lesson on the elements of art, using a slide show of pictures taken at the museum. The students were taught about shape, texture, line, and color. After the lesson, Ms. Linda visited each first grade classroom where the students were able to create their own piece of art, using the elements that were taught in the lesson.

Second Grade

First and second grades will be decorating tiles for the Mutt-i-gree program that they are learning about in the classrooms. These tiles will be auctioned off to help raise money for various community services. The Mutt-i-grees Curriculum is an innovative PreK-Grade 12 program that builds on children's affinity for animals and highlights the desirability of Mutt-i-grees or shelter pets. The goal of the curriculum is to enable children to grow up to be calm, confident, and caring. It has been implemented in more than 2,500 schools across the country and Canada. Oakview is very excited to have implemented this program in our school this year.

In addition to the Too Good For Drugs curriculum at Oakview Elementary, Coach Tackett had the Health Department come in and present the Tobacco Free Academy to all 4th and 6th grade students. The program presents the dangers of tobacco use to the students. The effects of tobacco, smokeless tobacco, and nicotine on the body were presented to students with examples and a power point presentation. Cathy Anderson and her staff talked to

the students about the dangers of tobacco use and why students shouldn't pick up the habit. The information presented was in conjunction with the curriculum Coach Tackett presents in his guidance classes.



Fifth Grade

This nine weeks has been full of snow days and classroom fun in the fifth grade! In science, students are doing hands-on activities to show what happens to light in different circumstances. We've made foldables, worked with mirrors and lenses, and studied the spectrum with prisms. In math, students are filling their brains full with information about fractions. We've solved equivalent fraction mysteries, learned how to double and triple our favorite recipes, and attacked those word problems with a hands-on approach! In social studies, we are currently studying about the Revolutionary War and "bringing them to life" with the help of a program called ChatterKid! SPRING TESTING

Richard Oppenheimer, Director of Student Achievement

State mandated testing is just around the corner for students in Kentucky's public schools. K-PREP assessments for students in grades 3 through 8 and for high school sophomores and juniors must be administered in the last 14 instructional days of the district calendar. With the wild winter we have had this year, those last 14 days begin on May 14, 2014, but we may have more school cancellations, so check with your school! Within that time frame, schools must choose 5 consecutive days in which to test.

For elementary and high school students, the testing window currently is May 14 through May 21 (remember, school will not be in session on May 20 due to primary elections) with make-up tests administered in the days following. For the middle school, the window is May 21 through May 27. Each school will set the schedule of testing, following closely to state requirements. Be aware that changes to the district calendar still could affect these 5 day windows.

All students enrolled in the high school courses of Algebra II, Biology, English 10, and US History must also complete end-of-course exams. Currently, these assessments are scheduled for the week of May 19 through May 23. Remember that the results of these specific tests account for 10% of the students' overall score in these classes.

Additionally, students enrolled in Advanced Placement courses at the high school have the opportunity to take AP tests, which, depending on their scores, may provide college credit.

GRANTS UPDATE

Elks National Foundation

A \$10,000 grant from the Elks National Foundation was received to expand school garden programs across the district. Members from the Ashland Elks Lodge # 350 will help build raised garden beds and benches at participating schools and provide gardening tools, soil, and plants. Also included in the grant are funds to support school assembly programs on health and nutrition.



Read to Achieve – Reading Diagnostic and Intervention Grant from Kentucky Department of Education

Crabbe, Charles Russell, and Hager Elementary Schools were awarded a Read to Achieve grant from the KY Department of Education in March. Each school will receive \$48,500 a year for a period of three years to support the cost of a



Reading Recovery teacher. The Reading Diagnostic and Intervention grants provide evidence-based interventions for struggling readers in the primary program (K-3). The schools will secure Reading Recovery teachers for implementation to begin in August 2014.

Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) Grant

The US Department of Education announced the award of a Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP) grant to the Ashland Independent School District. This three-year grant award totaling \$589,951.00 will be used to unify district elementary school physical education programs. By using the SPARK curriculum, the district will expand and implement a comprehensive physical education program designed not only to meet but exceed Kentucky Physical Education standards. Additional physical education instructors will be hired for the 2014-15 school year. All elementary school students will engage in additional daily physical activity through structured PE classes, active recess, and two physical activity breaks per day. Instruction in

healthy eating habits and good nutrition will also be stressed. The district will partner with community agencies to offer a comprehensive program to improve the overall health and wellbeing of our students and their families.
